KIRKGATE MARKET OWLS

"Created by architects Leeming & Leeming in 1904 we survey a magnificent emporium of market stalls. We've survived great wars & terrible fires but here we still are..."



LEEDS MINSTER OWLS

"Three churches on one site. The previous four fell victim to fire, war, plague and the Victorian! Five piers for the poor said Dr Hook, and so was built something worthy of Leeds."



QUEBEC OWL

"I've been etched in the glass since the 1890s. This was the original Leeds and County Liberal Club. We reside now in a pooh hotel!"



YORKSHIRE BANK OWLS

"Guineas, shillings and pence! It's all been under our watchful gaze. Dapper that's us! We survived world wars and depressions to boot, looking out over Kirkgate has been a hoort!"



LEEDS CIVIC TRUST OWL

"Captured in glass above the door I rest patiently while these custodians of the city consider all that is great in Leeds. Formed in 1965, Leeds is what we are about."



YORKSHIRE PENNY BANK OWLS

"I was built to guard your pennies, alas I'm a bank, no more. How grand! Outdresses and spurs. Look up and enjoy! Can you find me tapping my wings?"



TRINITY LEEDS OWL

"Landed in 2013, I am the small king of the gold and silver born from heat, made to measure, a wisdom wek and a city treasure. As the guardian of Trinity Leeds I am a tale told and a grin in your head forever."



LEEDS BRIDGE OWLS

"Our home was the first to be caught on camera with moving film in 1888 by Leeds the Prince. Lots of traffic led to the creation of the new east from Leeds Bridge in 1873."



KENNETH HOGGSSON HOUSE OWL

"Wall Street of the North this wist! All briefcases and bowler hats. We arrived in 1900, delightful in our John Thraulis freeze. Today Park Row oozes culinary delights!"



THE BOURSE OWLS

"Weather-beaten, rough and gritty! I was built from muck and brass. I nearly didn't make it as the seventies wrecking ball was poised to take me away in a cloud of dust!"



MALMISON OWLS

"In 1915 Leeds City Tramways Department opened as a symbol of how important transport had become. Leeds was the first to use electricity from overhead lines to power the trams."



FOUNTAIN HOUSE OWLS

"Doesn't everyone love art deco? We're silver and dashing, the original colour of the owls on the Coat of Arms. We guard the 1930s Portland Stone building with retro chic."



FLARES OWLS

"We've been here since 1899 and what a grand view we have of City Square. Notice we're not square but round! Eye up our rich green copper dome, balustrades and pillars!"



CORN EXCHANGE OWLS

"A cylindrical Yorkshire stone palace like a giant sweet jar with a dome lid. We maize. Culbert Brodick's masterpiece both inside and out once dedicated to the commerce of corn."

LEEDS CITY LIBRARY OWLS "If you think we look fabulous from outside, step in and check out the staircase of Byzantine Romanesque lines and paired dogs. We owls can't take all the credit for this grandeur!"

LEEDS TAPESTRY OWLS "Bavoux surely not! The Great City of Leeds was founded on textiles. A beautiful national treasure stitched by hundreds of volunteers. There's a parliament of owls in here too!"

MUNICIPAL OWLS "In 1876 we appeared crowning the railings of the fine municipal offices by George Corson the architect. Those men at the war ministry wanted to melt us down for rifles!"

LEEDS SCHOOL BOARD OWLS "A George Corson rich Italianate palace, the new home for the Education Board. A big 1900's wash and brush up brought a shine back to our feathers."

LEEDS TOWN HALL OWLS "Fluttering skywards, sited all around, we were the highest owls in the world for a century on this most famous town hall in the land. Opened in 1858 by Queen Victoria!"

MILLENNIUM SQUARE OWLS "Gold statues and white Portland Stone; we were born in 1933 to provide work in the depression. In 2000 our family grew with the new Millennium Owls!"

CIVIC OWL "This is no tradesman's entrance, all the worthies pass beneath me! I spend my days trying to catch a glimpse of my reflection in the green tinted glass of the Rose Bowl building."

LEEDS MUSEUM OWLS "The Mechanics Institute appeared in 1865 created by Cuthbert Brodick the City architect. Inspired by the Peirs Opera House it is an elegant triumph in stone."

ST ANNE'S CATHEDRAL OWLS "The old Cathedral was in the way of the traffic so it was torn down and we were born on a new one at the side of the road. It was 1904 and here we are nesting in the gutters!"

WAR MEMORIAL OWLS "Our life began in City Square, then we moved to our own enclosure of culture. Gallantly we commemorate the souls lost in conflict while Henry Moore watches us."

If you visit the 25 locations across Leeds City Centre marked on the Leeds Owl Trail map you will discover some unique owls. Suddenly you will set out on a voyage across history as each owl informs you of why it is there and gives you a brief snapshot of what it has seen in its lifetime. You'll have to keep your eyes wide open as some of the owls are not in the most obvious of places. 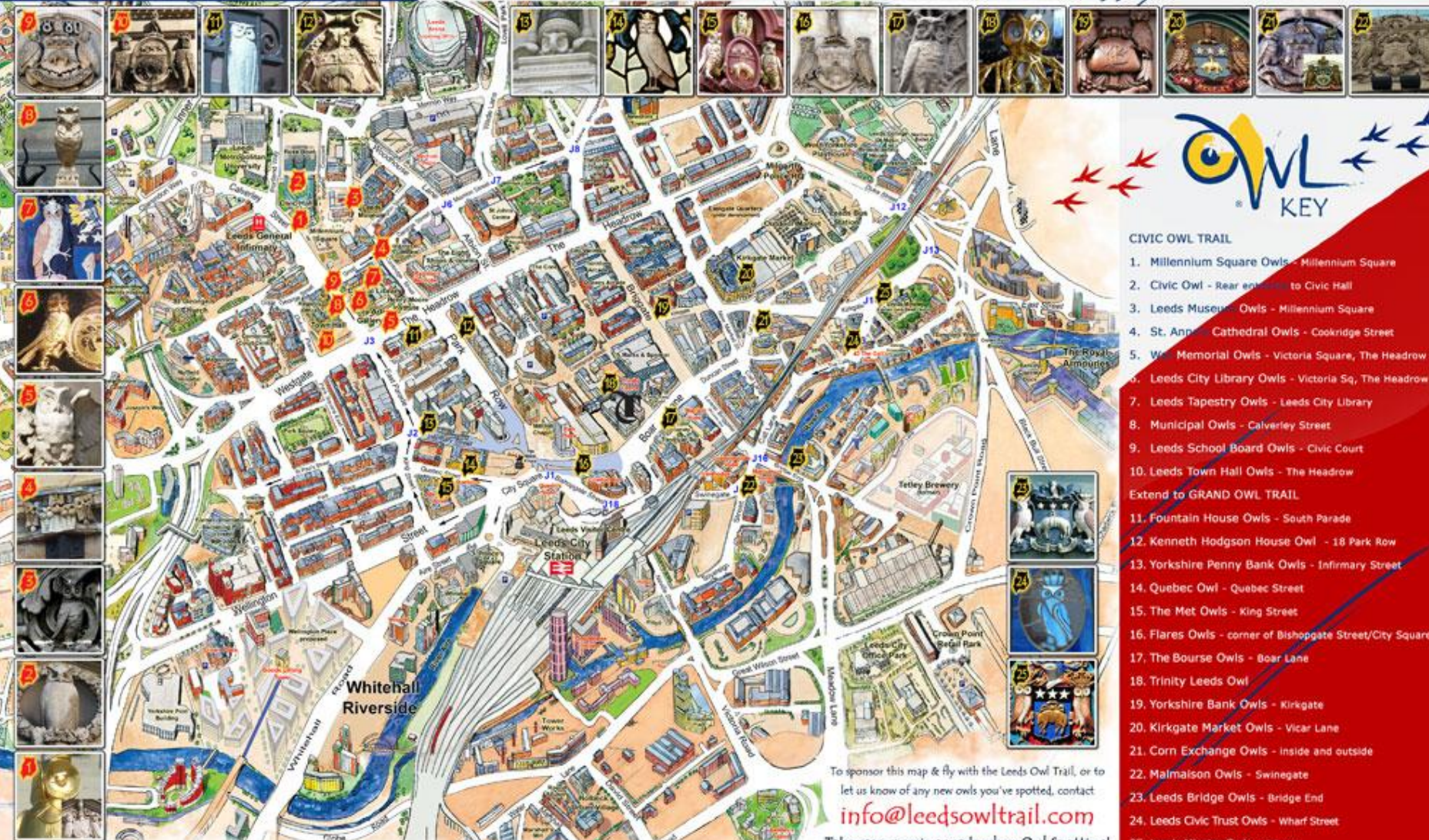
